LCMC 20th Annual Gathering Delegates

LCMC 20th Annual Gathering will be held on Monday, October 5, 2020 at North Heights Lutheran Church in Arden Hills, MN. Yes, one day only this year. This is due to the current restrictions placed on group gatherings in the state of Minnesota due to COVID-19. Breakout sessions, fellowship and networking activities, and vendors have been canceled for this year. Registration is limited to 250 people at the gathering and is first come first serve, online only, and limited to voting delegates. First Lutheran is allowed two voting delegates. The deadline to register is September 30th. The event will be live streamed as usual, however this year they plan to offer a more interactive experience for those who will be "attending" the event from home. LWR Kits

With school supplies going on sale, now is the time to help put together kits for LWR. Put the items in the quilting closet at the bottom of the front stairs when you bring them to the church. Bolded items are especially needed. The following are items needed to make one school kit, one baby care kit and one personal care kit:

Personal Care Kits:

- One light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" & 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- 2 or 3 bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- · One sturdy comb, remove packaging
- One metal nail clippers, remove packaging

School Kits:

- Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide or college ruled paper approximately
 - 8" X 101/2"; no loose-leaf paper
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- One 2 1/2" eraser
- One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately
 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

Baby Care Kits:

- Two lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies)
- Two long or short sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)
- Two receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square
- Four cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- One jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap
- Two pairs of socks
- · One hand towel, dark color recommended
- 2 or 3 bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 or 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars.
- Two diaper pins or large safety pins

Thoughts on the Readings

First Reading - Ezekiel 33:7-9

We used to play war games when I was a child in Ohio. Our bombs were harvested corn stalks. The loamy soil clung to the roots as we easily pulled these stubs from corn rows. We hauled these "dirty bombs" up in trees and waited for the other side to walk beneath us. Eventually, they got smart and sent scouts ahead to look out for our positions in the trees. It is difficult to imagine such a watchman, seeing us waiting in a tree but not reporting it to his friends. They might not be friends much longer.

Psalm - Psalm 32:1-7

People tend to know when they are doing something wrong. Children comprehend this at an early age. We do not, however, always want to change. Often we slide along with the behavior of the folks we call friends—or of the greater society—even though we know it is wrong. For some, guilt grows heavy and they confess their wrongdoing, often to the one they wronged. When that person forgives them, they experience release from the burden they had been carrying.

All our wrongdoings, even if directed at another person, are sins against God. Remaining silent about our faults only increases the debt by being deceitful. Yet, the one who acknowledges her transgressions to God will find deliverance from guilt and preservation from further trouble.

Second Reading - Romans 13:1-10

The old saying goes that there are only two things certain in life: death and taxes. We owe the first to God because of sin (Rom 6:23). The second, we owe the government. Paying taxes is expected, whether we like it or not. But what do we owe each other? Certainly, we owe it to others to not covet or steal their property. We should not have an affair with their spouses. We should not murder each other. Paul brings this idea of our indebtedness to others to a head, summing up the expectation of the whole law: "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love is all we owe each other; and that is a great sum.

Gospel - Matthew 18:1-20

Does Jesus ever answer us in the way we expect? When asked who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven, they might have expected him to answer, "your heavenly Father" or even, "Moses" or "Elijah." They were actually hoping he would name one of their own names. Instead, he pulled a child into the gathering and taught them to become like children. How does one become like a child?

Children receive other children. Generally, children do not try to do serious harm to others. They go to great lengths to find children they used to play with but who have not been around for awhile. They also easily forgive each other and settle disputes privately within their group of friends.

Listening for the Promise

WEEKLY DEVOTIONAL

Pentecost 14 - September 6, 2020

At that time the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?"

– Matthew 18:1 –

It sure seems like there are lot of people out there who think they're really great. Just ask them and they'll tell you so! Seems like if you're truly great, you won't have to tell anyone. They'll see it when they look at you, when they observe how you live your life, so there's no need to post on social media to try and convince people. In Jesus' opinion, it's not the CEO's of the world, or the top ten richest people, or even powerful elected officials. It's the most humble who are great in God's eyes. Maybe there's something to learn there.

In typical paradoxical fashion, Jesus pulls a small child onto his lap for an object lesson. "See this child," he says to his disciples, "this here is what greatness looks like." The child hadn't accomplished a thing. He hadn't even finished his schooling yet. He simply believed in Jesus and was open to his teaching. Greatness is a matter of faith; it's a simple, yet profound belief in the power and authority of Jesus, and that boy had it!

We all know that faith is a gift we receive from the Holy Spirit. It's not something we even ask for, it is simply given to us. However, it seems to be our human propensity to try and measure it, much as the disciples were trying to measure greatness. There are times, aren't there, when we wish we could give it to others. For instance when someone is struggling with a fatal disease and questions the very existence or goodness of God. But faith is not ours to give. We can pray for the Holy Spirit to give faith, but it's not in our power to bestow it on our loved ones or anyone else. If we had that power we would probably find a way to misuse it, anyway. Only the greatest to ever live has that power and he, when quizzed about who is truly great, points to a child as Exhibit A.

This is quite humbling to us, and it should be. We strive to be great leaders, great church people, great neighbors, etc. But still it all boils down to simple faith, faith like a child. It's not a contest anyway – it's an invitation to walk with Jesus as he transforms the world one heart at a time. It's okay not to be greatest! There's always going to be someone better. If you want to see who that is, just look at the child sitting in front of you.

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
